Going South-South For Jesus... April 15th-29th, 2012

rom the 15th to 29th of April at Ikot Ntuen of Oruk Anam L.G.A in Akwa Ibom State, a team of 48 young Seventh Day Adventists formed the ALIVE-Nigeria missions group that embarked on evangelism in that area.

The pervading presence of God's Spirit in that place through that period, was evident to the members of the team as well as the community. At the end of the mission trip, over 136 souls were systematically taught the key Bible doctrines and 7 initially were baptized. By the week after the volunteers left, 3 more souls were reported to have come looking for the church, requesting for Baptism and more Bible study. As minds were exposed to the truth, those erstwhile bound in mind were set free. John 8:32.

Each volunteer that attended this program was glad to have made it for the mission. The various



duties were shared in such a way that everyone present was made fully responsible for an aspect of the mission. Though physically taxing, the volunteers commented that they would not have passed an opportunity like they had anything else. With the variety of programs like the Medical Missionary training, extensive Bible study and continuous prayers, time spent there was spiritually rewarding as it allowed much room for reflection and renewal. The participants also had the opportunity to share their faith built from a personal relationship with Jesus through a study of the Bible.

We made contact with the local evangelist there, (Elder Gabriel John), whom I later met with to explore the possibilities of a mission at Abak. Soon afterwards, we were in discussion with the South East Conference President, Pastor Enebieni Enebieni Eko (PhD), as well as the East Nigeria Union Mission (ENUM) President, Pastor Bassey O Udoh (PhD). He was very pleased with the initiative and assured us of his support. After

fulfilling all protocols, we embarked on the actual mission, which held from 8^{th} - 29^{th} of April 2012.

Unknown to us, God had lkot Ntuen in mind, instead of our initial plan for Abak. For some reason Abak was not to be for now. The Church at lkot Ntuen had been depleting in membership over the years for many reasons, prominent amongst which was that, the surrounding community thought we were a cult. This was evident from the turnout during the first few days of our program. But God turned things around for us dramatically after our commu-

nity service work. A different view was created in the minds of the people, about our church.

lkot Ntuen was a different mission for so many reasons. We had over fifty (50+) volunteers at one time or the other, from all corners of Nigeria, ranging from students to working professionals, aged 18 – 65yrs. Everyone that was there all contributed to the success of the mission in one way or the other.

One of the highlights of the mission was a L.I.G.H.T (Lay Institute for Global Health Training) program, an initiative of Wildwood lifestyle centre and hospital in Georgia USA. This program was conducted by Elder Solomon Nwaejike, Director of RENASCENT EDUCATION MINISTRIES INT'L, located in Uhum Aba. It ran for two weeks.

Our strategy was not much different from the other previously held missions. We had medical missionaries sent from AMMI (African Medical Missionary Institute), who initially led out, and were assisted for the rest of the program by Elder Solomon's team of medical missionaries. The preaching and two-by-two/door-to-door Bible Study continued for the rest of the two weeks. At the end of all these, 7 precious souls were baptized into the church, and 3 weeks later, 5 more souls were added who hadn't quite made up their minds as at the time the program ended. We also saw several other members who had left the church many years before, but were revived by the program and felt the urge to return to the truth they had left.

We would like to say thank you to the earlier mentioned East Nigeria Union Mission (ENUM) President, the South East conference President of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, the South East conference evangelist, Pastor Edith, and Professor Mbon—former DVC of University of Calabar. Not forgetting Dr Amukele and Elder Solomon Nwaejike.

May God bless us all as we continue to work in His vineyard. Amen!

IKOT NTUEN 2012...Think Heaven!

AKWA Mission... Ikot Ntuen!

n the 15th of April, 2012 which was the date slated for ALIVE-Nig AKWA mission, with the theme, "THINK HEAVEN", members and volunteers from various parts of the country travelled down to the little village of Ikot-Ntuen in Oruk Anam local govt of Akwa Ibom state. The village though having the presence of Christianity and an even lower Adventist presence has its predominant faith as Qua-Iboe and its beliefs deeply rooted in spiritism. Its citizens are mainly farmers which accounts for the obvious presence of sand flies. Others work at Uyo the state capital and go daily there from Ikot-Ntuen. The farmers were greatly involved in farm work and harvesting of palm kernel and production of its by- products. As a result, they were hardly seen at home during the home visits as they left very early for the farms and returned after sunset. The villagers by reason of their being very close-knit recognized the presence of their visitors.

Methodology

LIVE immediately launched out on the arrival date, with a health lecture, an introductory sermon - which also highlighted the rest of the daily program topics - and its children's department program. We used the community's town hall as the main venue for our evangelism. The presence of visitors on the first night which was also the day of arrival, was made possible by the previous invitations given out by the local church, the village town crier who makes the daily village announcements, and invitations given to patients during the free medical consultancy service to the villagers. This had commenced during the week prior to the evangelistic messages by the medical missionary team from Africa Medical Missionary Institute (AMMI).

Our ladies slept at our local Adventist church and had to be up and be presentable before the guys joined for devotion at 5.30am every day. Most times some of us went to bed at 1 am. No mosquito netting on the windows, no electricity in the entire village, sleeping in a building by the busy highway - it was all a bit challenging but we made it.

The guys' quarters doubled as our dining room so they had to put up with some inconveniences



as well. There were tiny sand flies that bit almost unnoticed, but left red spots on the skin with the potential to become bumpy rashes that itch and break out uncomfortably. Some were sorely afflicted, but the Lord kept us all and none would think of missing future mission trips on account of the

tiny monsters.

Everyday, volunteers launched out into the village, combing every single home situated between the church which served as part of their home and the venue of the evangelism, informing those

who had not been informed about the program and reminding those who were already informed of the evangelism program and the free medical consultancy service that was on from dawn till evening.

ALIVE was received warmly by the residents who were warm, hospitable and receptive on the overall. They did not miss an opportunity to offer fruits and even money whenever they could. The evangelism continued to enjoy a larger turnout of visitors and children as attendees, who enjoyed the previous night's program kept inviting their neighbours and friends.

Ikot-Ntuen Medical Missionary Report-By Hope (AMMI)



African Medical Missionary Institute (AMMI

Te arrived in Wednesday 11th April, 2012 and we commenced consultation the same day at the Local Church. The villagers came enmasse the next day and we could barely attend to all of them before night fall.



We recorded a hundred and thirty-five(135) persons who consulted. Out of this number, about 90 persons received hydrotherapy treatment in our temporary sanitariums.

Prevalent Diseases

Most of the diseases the people of Ikot Ntuen suffer from is diet related. Topping the list of ailments are diabeties, arthritis and eye problem. Health lectures were given every evening in order to help the people improve their lifestyle.

Challenges

The language barrier big challenge for us since a majority of the people did not understand English language and could only express themselves in efik. The Lord was however gracious to us and a member of our team could speak Efik, this really was a bug help for us. There were other challenges of getting water for our Hydrotherapy treatments. We had to go some distance to get water every morning.

The People Response

The people of Ikot-Ntuen are very appreciative people who were very thankful for all the healthcare and Health lectures they received from us.









The Lay Institute for Global Health Training (LIGHT) arrived the evangelism venue, and took off with equipping members and volunteers of ALIVE to become effective medical evangelists. This program held after the morning devotion/programs, at the local SDA

daily by the pioneer, Elder Nwaejike Solomon C. Some topics that were treated amongst others during the seminar included: New Age-Old lies, Counterfeit vs Genuine Healing e.t.c Many other interesting topics which brought to light the counsels, principles and instructions given through the Spirit of Prophecy books were also highlighted. Several volunteers who were in attendance called the whole medical missionary training initiative, a blessing.











Community Service—Making a difference on the environment...!

LIVE AKWA mission had several community services included in order to meet some of the basic needs of the people of ikot Ntuen. The services carried out for the benefit of the community included the following:

Free Medical Examination: the medical missionary team from AMMI started a week before the program attending to the medical needs of the villagers and did this for two week. After their departure, the LIGHT medical team stepped in and ensured the work continued. This was done at the venue of the program and in certain peculiar cases at the patient's home; especially those who were identified during the home visits who cannot go to the venue.

Improving the Environment: The first Sunday of the program, ALIVE team beautifully dressed up with their lemon green AKWA mission T-shirts, went around the village cutting the grasses along the ever busy highway that crosses the village, to ensure a safe pedestrian's path; we weeded, swept, mopped and cleaned homes, cleared walkways on both sides of the road and generally made ourselves useful. Literally and figuratively, we were a shock. Our service swelled attendance at the evening sessions and we might have set a new standard for church groups that would have anything to do in that community in the future. The village's council hall which was the venue of the program and One of the village's conventional relaxation spots of the elders of the village were not left out.

Others: Several homes of the aged who live alone, having no one to help them had ALIVE team visit their homes to cut grasses, fetch water and do general clean up.

This indeed provoked great joy in the hearts of the villagers and increased the appreciation of the ALIVE team by the villagers.

We doubt that any group had done any form of community service in that village before. Our being from different parts of the country also fascinated and challenged the community at the same time. I think we may have impacted both young and old more than we realize as a result.

Baptism Service

t the end of the program, 7 souls rose up to be baptized. Thankfully, we sang together as we accompanied those precious souls down a steep road to the local stream. A pastor sent by the union to conduct the baptism was in person of Pastor Napoleon Obot— the previous district pastor of Seventh-Day Adventist church lkot-Ntuen district. Some volunteers who had worked hard on and prayed for prospects that agreed to take a stand with the church, felt sad when



they did not show up for baptism that day. However the Lord rewarded their efforts. A few days after the team ended the mission, a few more persons indicated for baptism.





Daily Evening Services

The Niger Delta region of Nigeria is largely Christian, without the people being necessarily spiritual. It is therefore deemed by so many Christian groups as one of the toughest places to evangelize in the country. We had been told by many people that it would be hard to get the people of Akwa lbom to commit to a changed life as a result of our efforts, but we were undaunted. Needless to say that God surprised the skeptics and us and did exceedingly, abundantly what we expected or imagined. The attendance increased every night. It was hard watching people visibly struggle with tough messages on the Sabbath, state of the dead and the manner of Jesus' second



coming. Some would leave, stay outside staring at the preacher for a while and then return inside the hall to wait till the end. Evening after evening, the message went out with power and hearts were enlightened by the entrance of God's word, calls



were made to take a bold step for Jesus; but many were debarred from taking the step by friends and loved ones while other's were even dragged to seat down when they dared to stand for an altar call. Some others who answered the call for baptism were not seen by the next evening. This led to the inauguration of a follow up team. The follow up team with the use of the daily register and with the help of the church pastor and members visited the homes of those who were regularly attending our programs and those who answered the various altar calls that were made during the evening programs. Giant strides were made as a result of the home visits as questions that they could not ask during the program were answered and all doubts cleared from their hearts, decided to be baptised, as E.G. White said "There are families who will never be reached by the

truth of God's Word unless His servants enter

their homes, and by earnest ministry, sanctified by the endorsement of the Holy Spirit, break down the barriers." Evangelism, 436. Even in the course of the home visits, a young boy who was a cultist confessed, was prayed for and was set free.

Over 20 gave their lives to Jesus on Thursday night. This was in addition to the 7 that had surrendered during the first week. As a result of God's blessings in this regard, the local conference started concluding arrangements to follow up with another full program within the next two weeks. Some of the young people have expressed the desire to grow and would like to be part of future ALIVE mission trips.

embers diligently carried out their allotted roles making for a beautiful general and improved output daily till the end of the program. After the LIGHT daily lecture, Bible studies followed which dealt with the topics scheduled to be discussed during the home visits. Shortly after, everyone trooped out in twos to visit the homes and farms of villagers to teach the truth of God to them. For some of the prospects, language was a barrier, but this was combated with the gracious help of the church members who were willing to join in the home visits to serve as interpreters. Daily homes were visited by members and volunteers after they have been empowered through the morning devotion, prayer sessions, Bible study and the LIGHT seminar, to share the gospel and still invite them for the evening session; the villagers gladly received the message, but some hesitated to attend the evening programs. As a result, the horn speakers we set were increased and strategically positioned so the message could get to hearts even from the comfort of their homes. Reaching people this way was possible as a result of the village's transformer which was stolen two weeks before the program, plunging the entire village into quietness and darkness each evening. The ALIVE AKWA mission had a uniqueness in its attendance as it had a flood of its executives right from the first day despite their very busy schedule. It also had in attendance even on the first night, the conference evangelist Pastor Eddy, Professor Mbon, the district pastor Pastor Gabriel John, an elder who came in from Eket as a volunteer, several other elders, and members and volunteers from all around the country.


